MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

This report represents the final quarterly performance report for the 2022/2023 financial year. Readers will note the absence of end of year financial data which is subject to external audit prior to publishing. Detailed financial statements, organisational performance and highlights will be presented in the 2022/2023 Annual Report which is currently being prepared.

It has been a busy close out to the year with many highlights of interest.

The Artisan's Guild has launched including a retail space on Macquarie Street which has resulted in high numbers of visitation and many crafts and works of art having been sold. Funded by the State Government with support from Council, the Artisan's Guild aims to become a self-sustaining incorporated collective of Artists and Artisans sharing physical spaces and human capital to create, showcase and retail their crafts.

Council's partnership with the Future Impact Group continues with the launch of the Our Futures Youth Program, *Chips to Seagulls*. The youth leadership program has been co-designed with a handful of young people over an eight week Ideas Lab. The Youth Leaders Program has been created to be an effective avenue of capacity building for 20 young leaders each year in the George Town area. In partnership with schools and local service providers, the Youth Leaders Program will host an array of high-end facilitators that will deliver relevant training to selected young people.

Perhaps one of the more exciting announcements was the approval of a development application for Line Hydrogen. This development will see the production of hydrogen using electricity produced from an onsite solar farm. The hydrogen will be used to fuel hydrogen powered heavy vehicles across the state in what we believe is an Australian first in the green hydrogen space. ABEL Energy also announced that they have secured their site for the Bell Bay Powerfuels development which will produce 300,000 tonnes of green methanol annually to supply the global shipping alternate fuel market. These projects combined equate to almost \$2B in local investment and will create many jobs for our community.

Operationally our staff continue to be challenged with high workloads. Our compliance staff continue to respond to high numbers of dog complaints, including dogs being at large, dog attacks and unregistered dogs. Officers will continue to prosecute where offences are proven in order to keep our community safe. Our outdoor team are equally busy responding to 93% of the almost 500 works requests received for the year. Building and planning permits also continue to be issued in great numbers. Interestingly, the value of building permits issued represent an increase of approximately \$4.9M in investment across the municipality in comparison to 2021/2022. All this occurring while Council implements a new corporate wide system. While disruptive to our processes, Council is confident that the new system will provide residents with an improved customer experience.

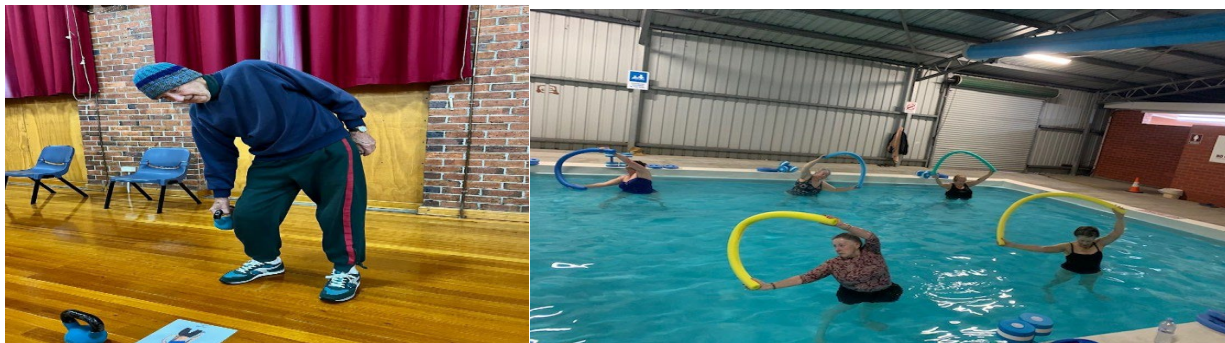

21. Arts, Culture and Experiences

On the 29th and 30th of June, ten local Aboriginal/Torres Strait Islander students welcomed the opportunity to participate in a two-day workshop hosted by Djuke Hart, Wakka-Wakka, Kuku-yanaji, and Butchula Man who provide education packages, workshops, and performances around Australia. The students were able to develop their cultural awareness, learn some contemporary Aboriginal dance skills, and made their own clapping sticks.

Traditional and ceremonial Aboriginal Dance has been a part of the Aboriginal culture for thousands of years as dance plays an important role in storytelling and spirituality.



22. Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund (ACIF)

During the month of April, Council applied for a \$18,000 grant opportunity through Cricket Australia and Cricket Tasmania's Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund program. Council was successful in its grant application. Council staff visited the George Town Cricket Oval and assessed the requirements for the compliant usage for the community and developed a plan for the upgrades in line with the needs of its municipality.

A further \$18,000 in funding will be provided for by the George Town Council. This project will help provide the community in George Town with compliant and quality synthetic cricket pitches that will facilitate training, and conduct tournaments.

The infrastructure will help the local cricket club deliver kids' programs and provide a space for the junior teams to practice and play its matches. It will benefit the municipalities-only cricket club to operate its Senior Male, Senior Female, Junior Male, and Junior Female teams, providing an opportunity for the community to participate in cricket.

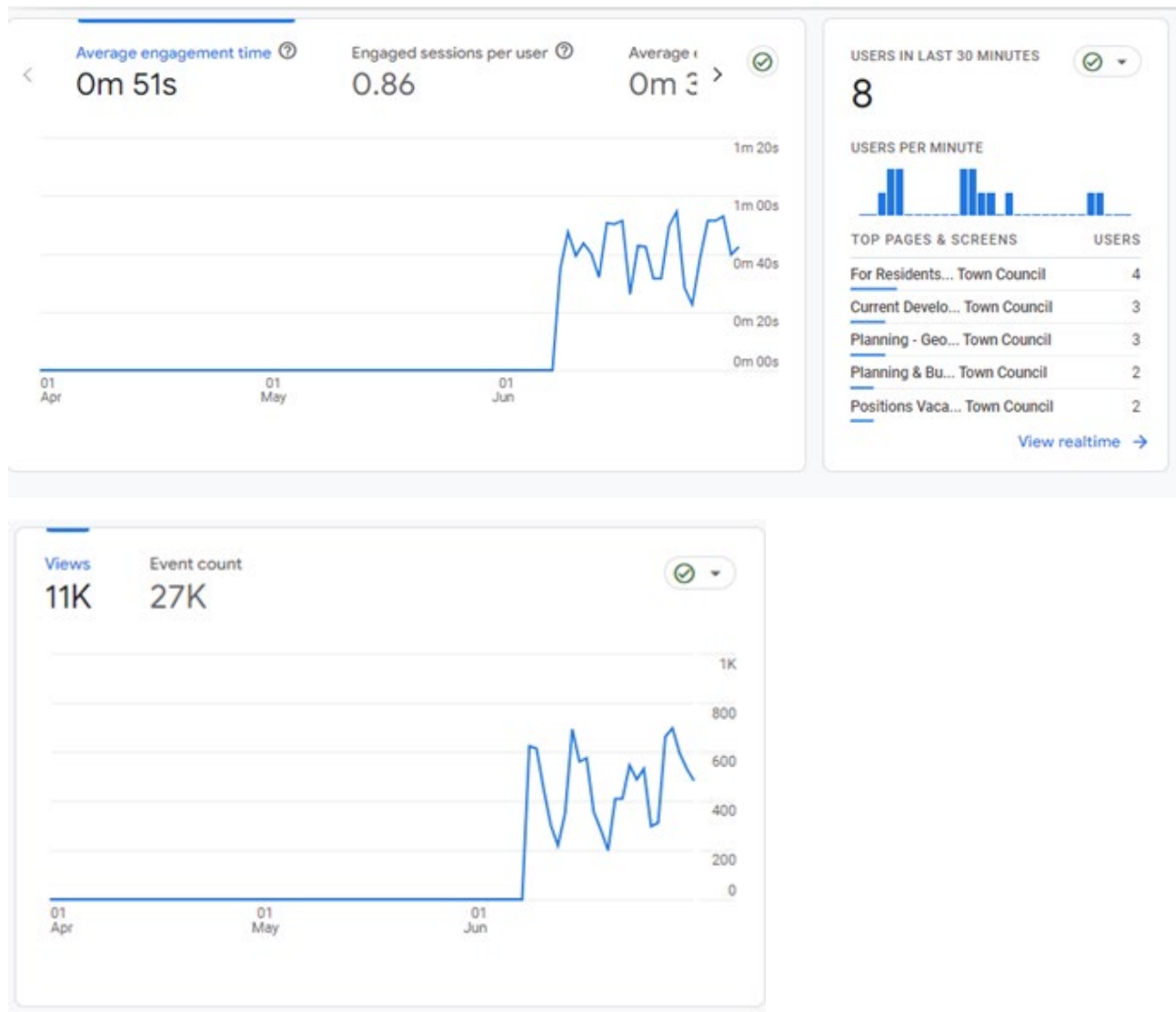

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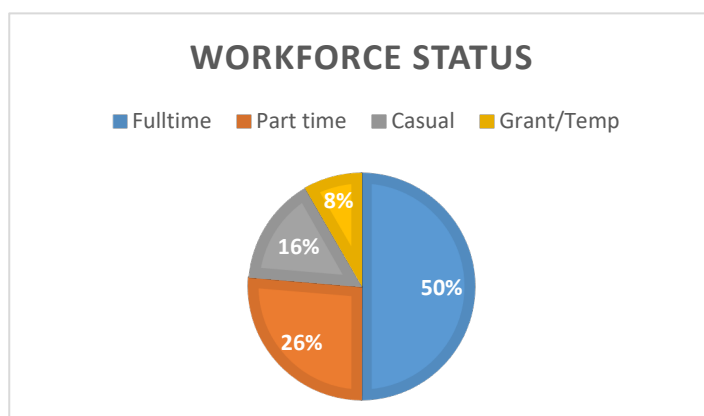
28. Establishment and Turnover

Launchpad have hit some exciting milestones over the last quarter, including the development of the “Launch into Employment” program, offering a Certificate III in Individual Support, and welcoming Carmen Gumley the new Launchpad Executive Officer to the project team. Carmen will also be overseeing the Make George Town Yours and Digital Warriors projects.

The Launch into Employment program is set to begin in the first quarter of the 2023/2024 and will be delivered by the Launchpads Community Engagement Officer. The program will run over three weeks and is designed to help people learn more about themselves, their qualities, attributes and design a career pathway plan to set themselves up for success.

The Certificate III in Individual Support is currently open to expressions of interest and due to commence in September.

The Launchpad Communal Space has remained open five days a week and has seen an increase in visitors. A snapshot of what the Launchpad Communal Space has hosted over the fourth quarter include a Chronic Pain Morning Tea, the Our Futures Youth Advisory Council, the Digital Warriors “Digital Shots” Program, Drumbeat, Aboriginal Youth Workshops and visiting services including Futures Isle and Nebhub.

Make George Town Yours:

The Make George Town Yours Project (previously Renew George Town) has been working toward key infrastructure deliverables including the Parklet Pilot Project and the Macquarie Street Entry Statement. The Make George Town Yours Project Team and Working Group have also identified additional upgrades to the Macquarie Street Precinct to enhance the look and feel of the streetscape.

The parklets have been manufactured and we are awaiting delivery. Sites have been selected based on the expression of interest process and we are anticipating that the parklets will be available for public use in September.

Digital Warriors:

The Digital Warriors Project has been very popular, with our Digital Tutor providing drop-in digital support from the Launchpad Communal Space two days per week and from the George Town Community Hub one day per week.

The Digital Tutor has been developing more extensive group workshops that can be provided as an outreach service, visiting other community organisations or businesses that may require some specialised digital support on topics of interest.

Our Futures:

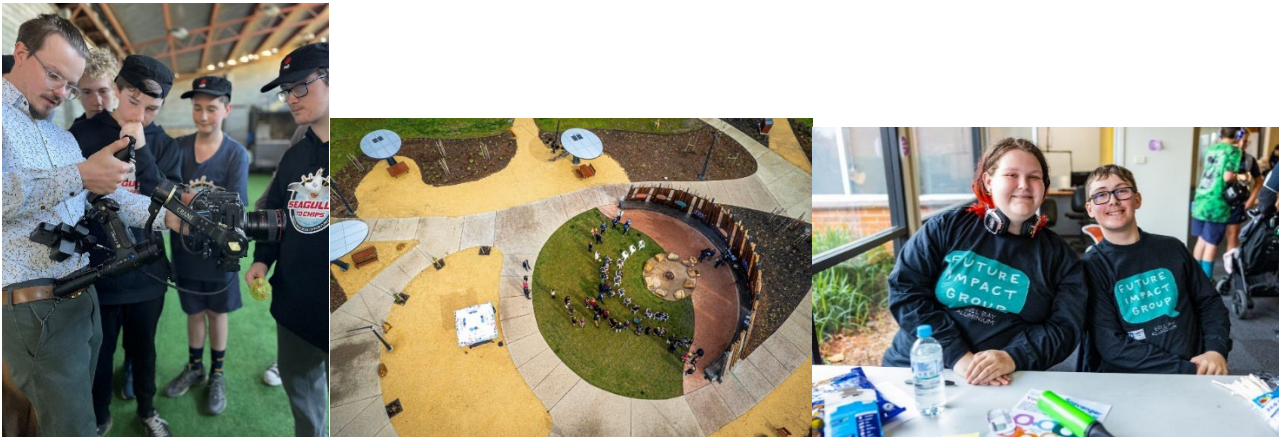
From the successful Youth Week event held in May with over 250 attendees, the Our Futures Youth Project in George Town has recently launched two capacity building opportunities for local young people to engage in. The **George Town Youth Advisory Group** provides a platform for young people to have a voice to shape decision makers in George Town, and the **Seagulls to Chips Youth Leadership Program** provides training and opportunities for young people to develop their skills and insights into building social impact.

The Seagulls to Chips Youth Leadership Program, which has been co-designed with local youth has recently commenced with 17 participants registering. Held on Tuesday afternoons, the program entails 12 leadership sessions delivered by experts in the field, mentoring the young people to create their own opportunities and events to be leaders in George Town. The first day of training was held in Launceston at Futures Isle and featured team building workshops, video and creative content training, and an esports event workshop.

During the month of June, the first formal meeting was held of the George Town Youth Advisory Group (official name coming soon!). Nine (9) local young people have been providing insight and advice to Mayor Greg Kieser, Councillor Heather Ashley and Councillor Winston Mason. Loads of topics have been discussed as they begin the conversation of supporting our future. Some of the discussions included street lighting, vandalism, safety, creating youth drop in spaces, and issues around smoking and vaping.

The Our Futures Project Officer continues to be active in the community supporting youth programs at the George Town Neighbourhood House, Library and local schools programs. The Project Officer has also been connecting with youth in public spaces to help curb ongoing issues of vandalism and to promote community pride in and around George Town.

Future projects include a 10 week drumbeat program with Mission Australia, conducting the Youth Voice Collection, travelling to Clarence City Council for the annual Youth Advisory Council Summit, and creating youth opportunities with the Seagulls to Chips participants.
