MUNICIPALITY SNAPSHOT

The Municipal area of George Town Council is located in northern Tasmania, about 50 kilometres north of the Launceston CBD. It is bound by the Bass Strait in the north, the Dorset Council area in the east, the City of Launceston in the south, and the Tamar River in the west.

The George Town Council area includes the localities of Beechford, Bell Bay, Bellingham, George Town, Hillwood, Lefroy, Long Reach, Low Head, Lower Turners Marsh (part), Lulworth, Mount Direction (part), Pipers Brook (part), Pipers River (part), Retreat (part) and Weymouth.








The George Town Council area includes rural and rural-residential areas, with the main township at George Town. Significant industrial areas are located just south of George Town, including the Bell Bay Advanced Manufacturing Zone. Rural land is used largely for agriculture (particularly sheep and cattle grazing) forestry, strawberries and vineyards. Tourism is also an important industry.



MAYOR'S MESSAGE



It is my pleasure to present the 2024/2025 Annual Report. A year of celebration of arts, culture and events. Some of the highlights include the Solstice in the Square, a winter celebration which attracted over 2,000 attendees and featured music, fire performances, food, and art installations. The Art-Street-Art transformed George Town into an open-air gallery, showcasing murals and installations created by local artists and youth. The Tamar Valley Folk Festival spanned three days and included concerts, workshops, markets, and children's activities. The George Town (Mini) Summer Series brought live music concerts to Weymouth, Hillwood, and George Town, highlighting Tasmanian artists and of course, the much celebrated New Year's Extravaganza hosted by the George Town Neighbourhood House.

contributions from Lighthouse Regional Arts, local schools, and youth-led initiatives. The second year of the Kinimathatakinta/George Town Art Prize celebrated local identity and the environment, and the inaugural Youth Art Prize received over 40 entries across various age groups.

The Creative George Town Workshops engaged 811 participants in activities such as flower crown making, acro balance, circus arts, fluid art, and cultural practices.

Council partnered with Aboriginal community members to deliver events for NAIDOC Week and Reconciliation Week, including flag-raising ceremonies, smoking ceremonies, film screenings, and workshops. Signage for the First Nations Gathering Space was installed, featuring artwork by Palawa artist Susan Mansell. The Bass & Flinders Maritime Museum celebrated Matthew Flinders' 250th birthday through an international collaboration with the community of Donnington in the UK, and the museum acquired and displayed the historic whaleboat Mirage, and participated in the Australian Wooden Boat Festival.



Following initial support from Council and the State Government, the George Town Art & Artisan's Guild became an independent incorporated association. This has proven to be a great example of successful partnerships leading to sustainability of new cultural enterprise.

I am proud of Council's commitment to youth development through the Our Futures Youth Program. With initiatives including; Launchpad Drop-in Sessions offering weekly creative and mentoring activities, Seagulls to Chips Program supporting leadership and creative development, Future Changers Camp, a youth leadership retreat, the Youth Impact Council and the Youth Voice Showcase, which presented survey results and recommendations for youth wellbeing and engagement.

It is also with great pride to report on Council's continued investment in the local community, with some examples including St Vincent de Paul for its Dining with Friends program, George Town Art & Artisans Guild Inc for marketing assistance and the George Town Junior Football Club to assist with playing jumpers and attire. Council also supported local athletes attending competitions ranging from motorcross, boxing and basketball.

Some additional highlights I would like to bring to the attention of the reader include the inaugural Caring for Cats Program. This program is a state-first, aimed at reducing the number of stray and feral cats that can have a significant impact on local fauna and improving responsible pet ownership. During this pilot program, Council desexed 113 cats and microchipped 115 cats. A special thanks goes to Just Cats, TassieCats and Scottsdale Vet for their assistance throughout the program.



Adopted in June 2024, the George Town Street
Tree Strategy has guided the planting of 145
advanced trees. This year, plantings were installed
along Victoria Street, Anzac Drive, Blue Gum Dog
Park, Stonehouse Street and Cemetery Road.
The strategy will continue to be implemented in
the coming years, improving township amenity,
supporting temperature reduction, storm water
pollutant reduction and habitat provision. A further
3,000 trees were planted at the former landfill
in George Town. The program was delivered in
partnership with Tamar NRM and involved many
volunteers from across the community.

There is many more activities I could highlight. I implore you to read through a few more of them presented in the report.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE



Welcome to the 2024/2025 Annual Report of George Town Council. This report presents a number of highlights and the organisation's performance over the 12 months ending 30 June 2025. Performance measures of note include the annual operating of an operational surplus of \$70k in line with the 1.0% target set in Council's Financial Management Strategy.

Pleasingly, this result represents the seventh consecutive year that surplus has been achieved. This allows for cash reserves to be bolstered, enabling the organisation not only to meet its liabilities and obligations but also provides opportunities to invest in strategic initiatives for the benefit of the community.

I acknowledge the financial support provided by the Commonwealth and State governments through both recurrent and non-recurrent funding, as we do investment from our industrial partners in community programs and assets. This funding assistance reduces Council's reliance on rates and charges.

Council once again invested significantly in the renewal of its assets, including almost 10 kms in resealing of roads and approximately 500 lineal metres of paths replaced and 1.4km of new footpaths. The overall investment in renewal was approximately \$2.5M representing a greater than 90% renewable ratio across all major asset classes. This is in line with the target ratio of 90-100%. Interestingly, an asset sustainability ratio is reported as low as 47% which is well below the 100% target. This is a result of having to write down the depreciation of the outdoor pool which represents approximately \$1.535M additional

depreciation than previous years. Compounding the sustainability ratio was the diversion of renewal to capital required for bridge replacements following major storm events which significantly damaged a number of bridges.

Once again, the team have delivered a completion rate above 90% for Annual Plan actions and just shy of 100% for customer service compliance. This result is impressive when considering the increase in customer requests from 642 in 2023/2024 to 1,323 in 2024/2025. A total of 169 requests for service were lodged between 28th of August 2024 and 20th of September 2024 due to weather events.

Our planning and building teams continue to be kept busy processing building works to the approximate value of \$48M. The team's performance has been recognised, having received an award through LGPro for Organisational Excellence and a further two awards for excellence in the categories of Great Place and Planning Champion, awarded by the Planning Institute of Australia.

Council's Team Leader for Community Services was awarded the Emerging Leader award through LGPro. Council's Our Futures Youth Program was a

notable finalist. The Northern Tasmanian Alliance of Resilient Councils, in which George Town Council is a member, also received an award for Organisational Excellence. In the George Town Chamber Business Excellence Awards, Council was successful in winning the award for Best Marketing/Advertising Campaign for the Solstice in the Square event.

A fantastic year acknowledged by a number of accolades for our teams. I trust you will enjoy the ensuing report.

OUR PEOPLE

Council staff come from a range of backgrounds and locations with 71% of staff residing within the Municipality which helps our people remain connected with the community they serve. Council is committed to supporting our workforce by offering local internship and traineeship programs with community partners to establish career pathways, ensuring access to meaningful employment prospects that will assist in developing skilled people to meet future needs.

The following workforce data provided for the 2024/2025 financial year demonstrates Council's commitment to our community by providing employment opportunities where possible.

Establishment and Turnover

At the close of the financial year, George Town Council had 65 employees. The workforce establishment at the end of the reporting period was 54 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) positions (including vacancies). Council had 2 FTE vacancies at the end of the financial year.

A total of 15 new fulltime or part time staff commenced work with Council during the reporting period. Council also employed 10 casual staff to operate the George Town Pool for the period 1st October 2024 to 31st March 2025.

The year-to-date staff turnover rate is approximately 15%, aligning with the national average: Australian HR Institute (2025) Quarterly Australian Work Outlook – June Quarter 2025. Melbourne Australia: The Australian HR Institute (AHRI).

In April, George Town Council conducted its third staff survey, receiving 35 responses from a total of 74 employees, a response rate of 47.3%. The survey aims to provide meaningful insights into employee engagement, identify areas for improvement, and offer staff a platform to voice their concerns. It plays a vital role in fostering a culture of openness, continuous improvement, and alignment with Council's values and guiding principles. Key highlights from the survey revealed strong staff sentiment, with 88.5% of respondents saying they love or like working at George Town Council, and 85.7% feeling extremely, very, or somewhat valued in their roles.



Human Resources

Council is committed to a program of continuous improvement to ensure its human resource supports, processes and procedures are contemporary, fit for purpose and are relevant to the needs of our organisation.

We do this by consulting with and undertaking genuine engagement with our staff to consider their views and suggestions on improvement and efficiency and developing a safe working environment for all which ultimately underpins the positive workplace culture that exists at George Town Council.

Annual Appraisals

Annual Appraisals are conducted in the fourth quarter of each financial year, in line with the 2023 Enterprise Agreement. This year introduced a new approach to the process, supported by the implementation of a formal policy and procedure. The majority of employees participated in the appraisal process, with a small number to be completed following recent changes in key personnel.



ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS

George Town Big Plant Day

In celebration of National Tree Day on July 28th, we invite the community to join the team from Tamar NRM in this initiative. Together, we planted over 3,000 native trees, shrubs, and grass species endemic to the local area at the old George Town landfill site. This project was about restoring the greenery and natural habitat for local wildlife, improving air quality, and creating a beautiful, sustainable space for future generations to enjoy.

Over the past years, the community's green waste collection has been transported from the waste transfer station, mulched, and used to cover and prepare the soil for this rehabilitation effort. This means that the green waste from our backyards is now being repurposed to aid in restoring the old landfill site. Our communities' contributions have played a vital role in making this project possible.

Caring for Cats Program

In August 2024, we commenced our "Caring for Cats Program", a free cat desexing and microchipping pilot program for residents of the George Town Municipality.

As is the case with other municipalities, the George Town Local Government area has a high rate of cats that by law must be desexed. Additionally, cats over the age of 4 months must be microchipped so that if lost or injured, the cat can be returned safely to its owner.

This program offered free desexing and microchipping and is designed to assist families with cost-of-living pressures. Importantly, this ensures better welfare for cats and prevents unwanted litters.

During this pilot program, we desexed 113 cats and microchipped 115 cats. A special thanks goes to Just Cats and Scottsdale Vet for their assistance throughout the program.





National Road Safety Week 11 - 18 May 2025

Council secured grant funding to assist in spreading the message "Pledge to Drive So Others Survive". From 11–18 May 2025, George Town Council proudly supported National Road Safety Week by installing awareness signs across the municipality to promote safe driving, every day, not just during the campaign. This initiative was made possible thanks to the dedicated efforts of Council staff and members of the George Town Youth Impact Council, who ensured the safe and effective placement of the signage.

George Town Mountain Bike Trails

It's been a big year for George Town's Mountain Bike Trail Maintenance Crew, with the trails looking better than ever. The crew have kept on top of regular upkeep such as vegetation trimming, removing fallen branches/trees, grooming trail surfaces, and clearing drains, ensuring the trails stay safe and enjoyable for riders year-round. This was no small feat, given the crew had to dedicate a whole month to clearing fallen trees after the extensive weather damage incurred in August 2024.

On top of that, the crew rebuilt 12 kilometres of trail, giving new life to Buzzcut, Desperado, Flow Head, Roulette, Slap Happy, Liquidus, and parts of Helter Smelter and Humbugs & Haystacks. Raised decking was installed in swampy areas of Claysnake and Rickerty Split, and major junctions at the Saddle, Cul-de-sac, and Summit were reworked to improve drainage and make them more visually appealing. The crew also tackled major drainage issues across all trails by installing piped culverts to keep the trails rideable in all conditions.

The biggest highlight of the year was the construction of a brand-new, hand-built A-line off Humbugs & Haystacks, which was well received and even featured as a stage in the Tas Gravity Enduro event.

A big thank you to our Trail Mates, whose generous support helps keep our trails maintained, improved, and ready for riders all year round.



Council is finalising a comprehensive tourism strategy to showcase the municipality's unique attractions and grow the visitor economy. Developed in partnership with Kingthing Marketing, the strategy has progressed through community and business consultation and is now in its final stages. It will be presented for endorsement in the 2025–26 financial year and will provide a clear, targeted framework for promoting George Town municipality as a destination for an unforgettable visitor experience.

Health and Wellbeing Committee

As part of the George Town Health and Wellbeing Strategy, a core group has been engaging key community stakeholders who will play a vital role in shaping and supporting our local health and wellbeing priorities. These stakeholders represent a wide range of sectors and community interests, ensuring a collaborative and inclusive approach.

In addition to stakeholder engagement, we have also undertaken interviews with a number of independent community members to gain valuable insight into local needs and experiences. These interviews are in the final stages of completion and will soon inform our strategic direction.

The Health and Wellbeing Committee will officially commence its work in the 2025/2026 financial year. This marks an important step forward in our commitment to addressing health and wellbeing gaps and building a stronger and healthier George Town.

The new signage at the First Nations Gathering Space and Windmill Point highlights two significant landmarks in our townships. The First Nations Gathering Space sign was initiated by the Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) Working Group, while the Windmill Point sign replaces historic signage that had deteriorated over time. The bases were locally fabricated by George Town company CPT Engineering, with the text panels produced by Tasmanian business Flying Colours. Both signs feature artwork by local Palawa artist

Road and Footpath Network Plan for Low Head & George Town

Susan Mansell.

Adopted in the May 2025 Council Meeting, these plans are technical guides that identify the road and footpath hierarchy in George Town and Low Head. They identify what standards some of the main roads should be built to, based on the network hierarchy and traffic volume.

They guide the standards that may be applied when new infrastructure or upgrades are required to make sure the roads and footpaths will function appropriately as traffic volumes increase with growth. When Council undertakes upgrades or receives requests for upgrades, the documents will assist in determining the applicable standards.

George Town Open Space Plan

Adopted at the June 2025 Council Meeting, this plan serves as a strategic guide to assist Council in making informed decisions regarding public open space within the George Town area. It aims to provide a diverse range of opportunities to support Council's future investment and planning for public open spaces.

AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS

Planning Institute of Australia - Awards for Excellence

George Town Council's planning department had the honour of attending the prestigious Planning Institute of Australia (PIA) Awards for Excellence in December 2024 and was awarded in the *Great Place* category for Regent Square and Tamara Burt in the *Planning Champion* category.

The redevelopment of Regent Square has truly transformed this public space, setting the stage for vibrant community events like Solstice in the Square. This flexible, multi-purpose venue will only grow in its importance, with its role as an event space set to expand in the years ahead. Council provides financial support through grants in three streams:

- Assistance to Individuals under 25 up to \$1,000 to participate in state, national or international events.
- Council Fee Remissions up to \$500 to assist organisations in offsetting the cost of Council fees.
- Community Grants available up to the amount of \$2,000 for Community Organisations.

The amount of funding available in any one year is determined by Council in its budget estimates in June/July each year.

Healthy George Town

The Healthy George Town program delivered a diverse range of health and being activities from September 2024 to June 2025. Sessions were conducted across six different facilities: Memorial Hall, Port Dalrymple Pool, Bee Bop Dance Studio, Graham Fairless Centre, George Town Bowls Club, and the Kanamaluka Trail. The programs ran in two main blocks: September-December 2024 and February-June 2025.

The free-of-cost health and wellbeing program for our community has been rewarding and beneficial for the municipality. The diverse set of programs designed to cater to various age groups and abilities has seen a gradual increase in numbers over the last financial year.

The programs were designed to overcome barriers such as lack of opportunities, social disconnection, and lack of health literacy in our municipality, and were closely aligned with the state government health promotion frameworks such as promotion of physical activity, mental health, and wellbeing, as well as improvement and management of chronic conditions.

Armchairs George Town emerged as the most popular program, attracting 985 participant sessions (21.8% of the total). This reflects strong community interest in low-impact, chair-based fitness activities. Programs like Jazzercise, Pilates, and Pickleball showed consistent mid-range participation, suggesting stable but niche appeal. The 2024–2025 Healthy George Town program successfully engaged the community through varied health and fitness opportunities.

In addition to our ongoing Healthy George Town Program, we conducted a series of information sessions over four weeks in June. We also interviewed select participants who have benefited from the program to develop a testimonial video. Videographer Nick Hanson produced this video, highlighting the various sessions offered and the positive, life-changing impact of the program on individuals.





Understanding Autism and ADHD from a Neurodiversity-Affirming Perspective This session was facilitated by the Healthy Mind Centre. Information included a closer look at Autism and ADHD, attendees had the opportunity to ask questions relating to their own circumstances.

Living with Arthritis

Facilitated by Arthritis & Osteoporosis
Tasmania. It covered a range of topics, including different types of Arthritis and what you can do to live well with the condition.

Diabetes Services and Programs

This session was facilitated by Diabetes Australia. Information was given on services and programs available for people living with diabetes. The facilitator gave out showbags with information packs.

Healthy Eating

Facilitated by Eat Nutrition. The workshop included information on healthy eating and practical cooking. The group cooked a healthy ramen and ate together at the end of the session. We had great feedback from this group of attendees.



GEORGE TOWN SWIMMING POOL

The 2024–25 period recorded a total attendance of 19,941 across morning, day, and booking sessions. Peak activity was observed in February, followed by March and January, reflecting seasonal patterns and key community events.

Day session attendance outpaces morning sessions, indicating higher demand for









Re-burial of Matthew Flinders

In July 2024, volunteers Margie, Craig, and Vince represented the Bass & Flinders Maritime Museum at the reburial of explorer Matthew Flinders in Donington, UK—his birthplace—250 years after his birth. This historic event followed the 2019 rediscovery of Flinders' remains near London's Euston Station.

Inspired by their experience, the team hosted a local commemorative service at St Paul's Chapel, Low Head, to share their thoughts and experiences. The event featured a presentation, memorabilia display, and was attended by approximately 40 community members.

Following their involvement, the volunteers were invited to share their experiences at Parliament House and enjoyed a luncheon with local MP Nick Duigan.



Whale Boat — Mirage

A Piece of History Arrives at the Museum!

On 5 June, the Bass and Flinders Maritime Museum proudly welcomed the Mirage, a 165-year-old whaleboat, into our collection!

Originally rescued and conserved by the Port Sorell Historical Group two decades ago, the Mirage has now found its new home in George Town. Before it's lifted onto its custom-built cradle for display, it will undergo careful re-oiling, painting, and staining.

This major move couldn't have happened without the incredible efforts of Kempe Engineering and Pfeiffer Cranes. Due to safety regulations, a specially engineered dolly was created just to transport the vessel inside.

With support from the Australian Maritime Museum, we received a \$6,000 grant to help build the cradle that will allow visitors to admire the Mirage for years to come.

The Mirage also made an appearance at the 2025 Australian Wooden Boat Festival.

Australian Wooden Boat Festival

On February 7th to the 10th, The Australian Wooden Boat Festival made a return to Hobart where people discover a selection of Wooden boats, linked to the rich maritime heritage. Whether it was the beautiful tall ships coming through the River Derwent or the stunning selection of vessels afloat and ashore, it was an unforgettable experience. The festival offered workshops, a kid's village, live music, displays, exhibitions and so much more, and of course the amazing food and beverage options.

YOUTH

Art-Street-Art 22 NOVEMBER 2024

The Art-Street-Art event was a vibrant celebration of creativity, community, and cultural expression. This youth-led initiative brought together talented artists, local schools, and businesses to transform everyday spaces into an open-air gallery, sparking meaningful connections and conversations about the role of art in place-making.

The official opening on Friday, 22nd November, attended by the Premier Jeremy Rockliff, Michelle O'Byrne MP, Speaker of the Tasmanian House of Assembly, and Robert Fairs MP, was a proud moment for the community. The event attracted a fantastic crowd to celebrate the culmination of months of hard work. Featuring works by local artists such as Bec Taylor & Friends, Ben Miller, Emily-Rose Wills, and Elev8ed Creations, the project showcased the incredible creative potential within George Town.

Artists worked closely with the community to create something special. KreamArt collaborated with local youth to design a piece that transformed a building into a vibrant, creative space they now call their own. Meanwhile, Sam Dobransky achieved a personal milestone with his largest mural to date, stretching an impressive 80 metres along the Woolies alleyway and injecting life into an otherwise overlooked area.





Nathan Dubsy Want Session

Through Council's Youth Services, we engaged with school speaker and author Nathan "Dubsy" Want who helps teens and parents through life's inescapable moments. Dubsy delivered multiple sessions at Port Dalrymple School about online safety and bullying, followed by a mentoring session with the Seagulls to Chips participants about Choices.

Dubsy also hosted a Parent Session highlighting key moments facing teens, providing parents with the tools and strategies to support and lead their teens through current and future moments by fostering growth and resilience.



Seagulls to Chips Graduation and 2025 Program

The 2024 Seagulls to Chips program concluded with a graduation on October 15th, with all 21 participants attending, along with families, education, Council and community partners. The program featured a range of leadership training opportunities, creative content and connections with the youth to improve living conditions for youth in George Town.

The Seagulls to Chips participants reflected on their journey, highlighting that they have improved confidence and skills as a result of the program. The 2025 program is set to commence in July with a focus on kindness projects and sharing the stories of heroes in George Town.

Future Changers Camp

16 participants attended the Future Changers Youth Leadership Camp held at Spring Beach on January 13-15 in partnership with the youth program at the West Tamar Council. The participants who are also graduates from the Seagulls to Chips program, actively engaged in adventure-based and problem-solving challenges over the 3 days, working together and learning valuable leadership skills.

Due to the success of the camp, the Futures Changers Camp will continue into 2026.

Youth Voice Showcase

On Wednesday, December 4th, the Youth Voice Collection showcased the youth survey results along with recommendations for future works. Members of the community attended, along with the Youth Impact Council sharing recommendations made by the 308 young people who participated. The team showcased their findings and further opportunities for the community to contribute towards a better future.

Overall, youth in George Town prioritise safety, fun, inclusivity, opportunities, and community engagement as essential to their well-being and development. They value safe spaces, mental health support, art, and recreational activities, including improved sports facilities. Inclusivity, social support, and a sense of belonging were identified as key, alongside opportunities for education, employment, and skill-building. Additionally, they seek a voice in shaping their community and contributing to its growth through meaningful engagement.



George Town Youth Impact Council

The Youth Impact Council continue to represent their region. Throughout the 12 months, 17 young people meet consistently and continue to raise issues and ideas that affect local young people. The team delivered the annual Mock Council meeting in October, addressing issues and raising motions such as bus shelters, legalised graffiti walls, improved sports grounds, and raising mental health concerns in George Town.

During March, the Youth Impact Council partnered with NebHub to help deliver the Futures Expo, a Careers Expo targeted towards students across the north. This expo had over 60 stallholders from industry partners and community services.

The Youth Impact Council have also conducted a car wash fundraiser, raising funds for outdoor water play components for the future development of the George Town Swimming Pool.

Each month, the team conduct regular meetings and invited a variety of guests to connect with them, such as the Tasmanian Police, Electoral members, Council staff and youth service providers. In June, the Youth Impact Council partnered with Port Dalrymple School to support Tasmanian Charity, Speak Up Stay ChatTy, with a Shorts Day, encouraging local businesses to wear shorts for mental health. The Youth Council also partnered with George Town Council to volunteer their time at the Solstice in the Square event, which saw over 2000 people attend.

George Town Youth Week

During Youth Week in April 2025, local young people had the opportunity to connect in meaningful ways across a full week of activities, partnering with skilled youth workers and professionals delivering adventure-based activities and attending youth-based events.



Activities included Hillwood rock climbing and abseiling, mountain bike riding at Tippogoree MTB trails, fishing with FishCare Tasmania, attending the Rock Challenge event in Launceston, attending the Exeter Youth Week event, and participating in Minute to Win It challenges at the Kinimathatakinta/George Town Library.

Launchpad Drop in

Since February 2025, Council's Youth team have offered free youth drop in sessions at the Launchpad on a Thursday afternoon.
The Launchpad offers a safe space for young people aged 12-17 to be creative, connect with service providers offering specialised activities, and to explore new pathways of youth engagement.
Some highlights include mountain bike mentoring, polymer clay workshops, and lantern making.

Youth Mental Health First Aid

In May 2025, 20 community members who work with young people completed Youth Mental Health First Aid facilitated by iTrain Australia. The opportunity was highlighted by the youth voice collection data as a priority, with the Youth Impact Council recommending the training.

With the support of the Liberty Bell Bay Community Assistance Grant, the training was well received as the George Town community looks to further its support for local young people.

ARTS AND CULTURE

2024/2025 was a significant year for arts and culture in Kinimathatakinta/George Town. Council delivered a vibrant program of exhibitions, workshops, festivals, and community arts initiatives, strengthening the municipality's position as an emerging creative hub in northern Lutruwita/ Tasmania. This year also saw Council build on partnerships, pursue professional development, and pilot new programs that connected local artists with broader audiences.

Reconciliation and Cultural Awareness

Council continued to embed reconciliation and cultural awareness in its arts and culture activities.

NAIDOC Week (July 2024): Celebrations included a flag-raising ceremony and morning tea, a film screening, and community workshops, delivered in partnership with local Aboriginal community members.

National Reconciliation Week: In May 2025, the Arts and Culture Officer represented Council at the National Reconciliation Week breakfast, strengthening connections and building understanding around cultural inclusion and truth-telling in creative spaces.

Kinimathatakinta/ **George Town Art Prize**

Following the inaugural 2024 Art Prize, the 2025 Kinimathatakinta/George Town Art Prize opened in April 2025, further celebrating the unique landscapes and community spirit of the region. The Prize invited artists to reflect on the distinctive identity and environment of Kinimathatakinta/ George Town, fostering deeper connections between art, place, and community.

- Major Acquisitive Award: Jennifer Dickens, "Birdsong" – a layered meditation on land, memory, and heritage around Low Head.
- Kanamaluka Photographic Award: Jennie Timmins, "Iridescent Hues" – capturing the vibrancy of the Kanamaluka/ Tamar River.
- Packing Room Prize Award: Bobby Gloops, "The Alcoholic" – selected by the installation team for its emotional honesty and storytelling.
- People's Choice Award: Sabrina Guy, "Radiance Over kanamaluka".

Kinimathatakinta/ **George Town Youth Art Prize**

In a new initiative, the first Kinimathatakinta/ George Town Youth Art Prize was formally opened in alignment with Solstice in the Square in June 2025.





With over 40 entries displayed, young artists showcased works across painting, photography, drawing, and digital media. This prize reflects Council's commitment to supporting emerging creative talent and fostering lifelong engagement with the arts.

Creative George Town Exhibition Program and Gallery Activation

The inaugural Creative George Town Exhibition Program ran from January to May 2025, featuring six exhibitions across the Jim Mooney Gallery and the Watch House Gallery:

- Denise Cox & Michelle Lennard - Wildly Woven: Collaborative mixed media.
- Darryl Rogers Vanishing Point: Circular landscape paintings evoking ecological themes.
- Studio Keturah Small Grace: Intimate watercolours depicting Tasmania's seasonal beauty.
- Emma Magnusson-Reid Drifted Matter: Works on paper inspired by Beechford's environment.
- Amy Bartlett Ephemeral Fields for Safe Keeping: Explorations of identity, loss, and belonging.
- Post Graduate Gallery Society It Takes All Sorts: Diverse artworks by UTAS students and alumni.

Exhibitions were well-attended, with positive community feedback highlighting the diversity of artworks and the opportunity for meaningful dialogue with artists. Several of the openings included artist Q&A sessions, with strong feedback from the community requesting more public programming focused on discussing art-making processes and art theory.

Insights from this pilot program suggest future exhibitions may benefit from longer durations and confirm the importance of maintaining the best practice of paying exhibiting artists.

The galleries were also used for community exhibitions, including:

- Lighthouse Regional Arts The End of the Rainbow: Marking 20 years of exhibitions in George Town.
- Art Street Art: In alignment with the broader project, featuring works by South George Town Primary School students, Star of the Sea Catholic College, ArtStreetArt participating youth, and the George Town Youth Council.

- Kinimathatakinta/George Town Art Prize
- Kinimathatakinta/George Town Youth **Art Prize**
- SML x ERW Pop-Up Exhibition





Creative George Town Workshops

This year marked the conclusion of the Premier's Fund for Children and Young People-funded workshops under Creative George Town. Workshops in July 2024 were delivered by:

- Wildly Abigail: Winter Flower Crown
- ROOKE: Acro Balance and Movement
- SupersillyUs Circus: Prop Manipulation & Clowning
- Outer Cove Creative Inc: Fluid Art and Theatre Sports
- Susan Mansell: Cultural Practice

A total of 811 participants engaged across the program's lifespan, demonstrating strong community appetite for accessible arts experiences.



George Town (mini) Summer Series

In early 2025, Council piloted the George Town (Mini) Summer Series. Three Sunday concerts were staged in Weymouth, Hillwood, and George Town, featuring diverse Tasmanian musicians Golden Sunbird, Where Water Meets, Dvrkworld, Scott Haigh, Stray Luxury, and Tash Zappala. Genres ranged from dream pop and cosmic rock to folk and electronica. Attendance highlights:

- Weymouth: 100+ attendees
- Hillwood: ~60 attendees
- George Town: ~70 attendees

Audience feedback was enthusiastic, with interest expressed from other communities for future series.

George Town Art and Artisan's Guild

In July 2024, with Council's support and guidance, the George Town Art and Artisan's Guild successfully transitioned to independence and became an incorporated association. This marks an important milestone in developing sustainable, community-led arts initiatives in the municipality.





CEMETERY

The cemetery team continued to provide respectful and responsive services, ensuring the needs of families and loved ones were met with compassion and care. A notable increase in reservations indicates forward planning by families, while operational work such as plaque placements and cement block replacements contributed to maintaining the integrity and dignity of the site.

Council remains committed to delivering cemetery services with professionalism, while planning for future needs through ongoing maintenance and infrastructure management.

FACILITIES

Over the 2024–2025 financial year, Council facilities recorded 953 total bookings across 13 venues. The York Cove Centre was the most frequently used facility with 272 bookings, followed by the Graham Fairless Centre with 216 bookings, and the Community Centre YMCA with 137 bookings.

Peak booking activity occurred in May 2025 (128 bookings) and June 2025 (117 bookings), largely driven by increased use of the Graham Fairless Centre and York Cove Centre. The quieter months were January 2025 (65 bookings) and December 2024 (60 bookings).

Throughout the 2024–2025 financial year, George Town Council approved a total of 107 event bookings across various community venues and public spaces. These events reflect strong community engagement and ongoing utilisation of Council facilities.

Sports Complex: 4 approvals

 Other venues such as Weymouth Hall, Lauriston Park, Lagoon Beach, and others recorded consistent, though lower, usage.

The busiest month was October, with 15 approvals, reflecting strong community engagement in the spring season.

Council venues continue to support a wide range of activities, including community meetings, sporting events, cultural programs, and private functions. The diversity in venue usage reflects the broad appeal and accessibility of facilities across the municipality.

Council remains committed to ensuring the availability, safety, and support of spaces that foster vibrant community life.

Trees Planted

Dalrymple Road and Old Bangor Tram Road Intersection Upgrade

Construction works at the junction of Dalrymple Road and Old Bangor Tram Road commenced in July 2024 and were completed over a period of nine weeks.

The project involved upgrading the intersection to current standards, with the primary goal of improving safety for all road users. The works have successfully enhanced traffic flow, pedestrian accessibility, and overall intersection safety in the area.

Dalrymple and The Glen Road Junction

Completion of the road upgrade took place during the first half of the year.

Asphalt sealing was carried out to preserve the surface's strength and extend its lifespan.

Final touches, including line markings and updated signage have now transformed the junction, significantly improving safety for drivers.

Old Aerodrome Road Stage 2

Construction of Stage 2 of Old Aerodrome Road commenced in December 2024 and was successfully completed in four months.

This phase involved the upgrade of approximately 1.6 km of roadway, beginning at the southern end of Stage 1 and continuing further south.

With the completion of Stage 2, a total of nearly 2.7km of Old Aerodrome Road has now been upgraded, significantly improving this rural road.

ANZAC Drive Building Revitalisation

The former RSL building has undergone a stunning internal renovation, featuring new ceilings, partitions, floors, and updated fittings, fixtures, and sewerage. A newly sealed car park enhances the transformation. The redeveloped space now offers an exciting opportunity for a new food and beverage operator, including a restaurant and bar.

Street Tree Planting

Council commenced the street tree planting program. Approximately 145 trees were planted.

These installations occurred in Victoria Street, Anzac Drive, Stonehouse Street, Cemetery Road and the Dog Park at Blue Gum Park. The variety of trees that were planted included Prunus Blireana and Prunus Cerasifera varieties. These trees will produce vibrant pink blossoms from late winter to early spring, enhancing the visual appeal of the street.

The project contributes to improving the livability of the neighbourhood, providing ecological and environmental benefits, strengthening social amenity, and supporting economic resilience.

The addition of street trees underscores Council's commitment to sustainable urban environments and addressing the challenges of climate change.

Baxters Road Bridge Replacement

The original bridge's timber beams and barrier railings were severely damaged during a heavy storm in late 2022.

The structure was made safe with a load limit imposed, until subsequent funding was received to allow completion of a new structure.

The new concrete bridge took approximately two months to construct.

Upgrade of Cemetery Fencing

As part of our ongoing beautification efforts at the George Town cemetery, new fencing has been installed around the Rotary and Monumental Rose Gardens to protect the beautiful roses from wallabies and kangaroos. This will help preserve the roses, offering a peaceful and respectful space for reflection year-round.

Aquatic Health and Wellbeing Centre

The George Town Aquatic Health and Wellbeing Centre has moved a step closer with the Development Application approved by Council.

The indoor facility, which will be constructed with a \$15 million Federal Government grant along with a further \$2.5 million from the State Government, will be open year round.

Features of the new centre will include a 25 metre pool, warm water program pool, gymnasium, fitness rooms and café facilities.

The 25m pool will be able to be configured in multiple ways to accommodate lap swimming, casual pool play and swimming carnival competitions.

Significantly, the new centre will also provide allied health services to help assist people with exercise and therapy.

Identified as a priority in Council's Sport and Recreation Strategy, this new centre represents a significant upgrade on the current swimming pool which has served the community well for over 40 years.

The facility is expected to be completed by October 2026.





Bellingham Solar Boat Ramp Lighting

Installation of solar lighting at the Bellingham Boat Ramp. The new lights enhance safety and visibility, creating a more welcoming environment for all users, particularly during early mornings and evenings.

Township Character Plan

The 2024/2025 period saw the implementation of the Township Character Plan, with a range of improvement works completed across the townships identified in the plan. These enhancements were well received by the community and demonstrate Council's ongoing commitment to enhancing open spaces for the benefit of residents and visitors alike.

Hillwood Open Space Plan

2024/2025 saw the implementation of the Hillwood Open Space. The following works were completed within this period:

- Leam Rd corner lease executed. Seats and bin installed.
- Seating and bin installed at Hills corner.
- Hillwood recreation ground entrance upgraded to accommodate an in and out arrangement.
- Concept plan for Hillwood HUB.
- Seat installed along the new path to Egg Island Reserve.

WASTE AND RECYCLING

George Town Waste Transfer Station

The George Town Waste Transfer Station processed over 4,000 tonnes* of landfill and recyclable waste this financial year. Through partnerships with specialised recycling providers, we diverted e-waste, batteries, metals, and paint from landfill, supporting the initiative to avoid, reduce, reuse, and recycle. We continue to collaborate closely with Circular North to improve waste and recycling outcomes across the region.

To support our residents, we offered two free drop-off weekends for green and hard waste. Additionally, during the severe weather events in August and September, flood and storm waste disposal fees were waived thanks to support from the Tasmanian Government. Residents also continue to benefit from weekly general waste collection and fortnightly kerbside recycling services, supporting safer and cleaner communities.

Hazardous Waste Collection 26 October and 8 March

We teamed up with Circular North for two free household hazardous waste collection days in October and March. These days allowed residents to dispose of any potentially harmful chemicals properly and safely. This included item such as solvents, household cleaners, floor care products, ammonia-based cleaners, pesticides, herbicides, vapes, poisons, pool chemicals, hobby chemicals, acids, alkalis, and farm vet chemicals.


New Website

DEVELOPMENT AND ENVIRONMENT

Public Health Statement

George Town Council's commitment to maintaining a high level of public health protection is identified in the Community Strategic Plan 2020-2030. As part of Council's public health goals and objectives for 2024-2025 the Development and Environment Department has sought to:

- Maintaining and enhancing service levels through contemporary service delivery models.
- Continuing to work with the Northern Region Cat Management Working Group to develop better cat management outcomes.
- Build on our relationships with all levels of government in managing the risks to wildlife, such as penguins.
- Encourage healthy activity in the promotion of our region as a destination for taking a dog for a walk.
- Continue promoting responsible pet ownership.
- Enhancing current service levels while developing contemporary delivery opportunities.
- Acting in a timely manner on reports of environmental health concerns.
- Monitor and report on the water quality of the kanamaluka/ Tamar Estuary as per the Tasmanian Recreational Water Quality Guidelines 2007.
- Continuing to provide a high level of public awareness, education and guidance on building health and safety matters.
- Acting in a timely manner on reports of buildings, or building uses, that involve possible health concerns.

Specific details and outcomes in achieving those goals are provided in the Strategic and Operational Plan report, including reports in Annexe C. The following information is also provided in accordance with the requirements of the Act.

Notifiable Diseases

During 2024/2025, Council were advised and investigated one notifiable report from the Department of Health.

Recreational Water Sampling

The Public Health Act 1997 requires Council to monitor recreational waters (which includes both natural water and public pools and spas) for compliance under the Recreational Water Quality Guidelines 2007.

Sampling of natural waters is undertaken monthly at specific locations from December to March to ensure the water is suitable for primary contact. A total of 28 samples were taken during the period December to March.

Water sampling results over the 2024/2025 season indicated that all natural water samples, met the Guidelines.

Sampling of public pools and spas is also undertaken monthly when the venue is open to the public to ensure the water is suitable for primary contact.

There are two locations in the George Town municipality which are sampled, the George Town Public Pool which is open from October to March and the Port Dalrymple School pool which, except for January and school holiday periods, is open all year.

Apart from a failed sample from the Geoge Town Council main pool in February, all pool samples were compliant.

Regulated Systems

George Town Council received 3 applications to register 18 cooling towers operating in the Local Government area. All applications were assessed against the Guidelines for Regulated Systems issued by the Department of Health. The applications and maintenance sheets were assessed, and registrations issued.

Places of Assembly

According to the Public Health Act 1997, a place of assembly is required for any mass outdoor public event. This means an event with over 1000 people for 2 hours or more. During the 2024/2025 period there was 1 event that required a Place of Assembly Licence, which was granted.

Nuisances, Complaints and Notifications

As local government operate under several different pieces of legislation, nuisance complaints are investigated under the relevant sections of the appropriate Act.

The Community Compliance Department received a variety of complaints during 2024/2025 with regards to Environmental Health. The complaints were related to noise, odour, outdoor burning, and unhealthy properties.

Community Compliance animal and fire hazard complaints recorded for this financial year totalled 287.

The majority of these complaints were related to either general animal enquiries (91 in total) or Fire Hazard enquiries/complaints (81 in total)

There were 13 dog attacks reported during the 2024/2025 financial year, resulting in a number of infringements being issued to dog owners and, in some cases, animals being impounded by Council. As a result of the 13 dog incidents reported, none of the dogs involved were declared dangerous by Council, however, two were euthanised upon owner's decisions. At present, only two declared dogs still remain in the Municipality.

A total of 1,368 dogs were registered or re registered with Council in the 2024/2025 year (66 dogs were advised deceased and 10 dogs leaving the municipality). This is an increase in registrations from the 2023/2024 financial year. There continues to be a large population of unregistered dogs in the Community, however the registration of these animals continues to be an important focus of Council.

Our Compliance Officers continues to engage with the Dogs Home of Tasmania, Just Cats and the Northern Regional Cat Management Working Group to assist in the development and education of all pet owners in our municipality. Council continues to provide a microchipping service and has microchipped a further 124 dogs and cats combined in this financial year. This figure is largely attributed to the Free Caring for Cats pilot program. Council will continue to offer this service to the entire municipality for both dogs and cats in 2025/2026.



Food Standards and Inspections

In 2024/2025 the number of food premises seeking registration with Council was 95, which includes P3-N and P4 businesses. Two businesses closed in the last 12 months and one business relocated to a neighbouring municipality. This is a slight increase in the number of premises registered in the previous year.

The number of food premises inspections carried out during this period was 92. Although P3-N and P4 premises are only required to notify, distilleries and those businesses that have a state-wide registration are inspected. As stated in last year's report, inspections were undertaken over the course of the year with each premises/operator being visited at least once during this period.

Immunisations

The School Based Immunisation Program (SBIP) was delivered in conjunction with the George Town Medical Centre and provided vaccinations for school age children in grades 7 & 10 against preventable diseases in accordance with the Australian Standard Vaccination Schedule. Immunisation sessions were conducted at both Port Dalrymple School and Star of the Sea Catholic College. 51 students were vaccinated. The vaccinations offered to students were Human Papillomavirus (HPV), Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (Whooping Cough) and Meningococcal ACWY.

Building and Planning

Council staff continue to take pride in working proactively with our customers to guide them through their planning and building processes, enjoying seeing the fruits of our labour when new buildings are completed and occupied.






Underlying Surplus/Deficit

Underlying Surplus/Deficit \$ and Surplus Ratio




Asset Consumption Ratio

This ratio indicates the level of service potential available in Council's existing asset base. All asset classes have remained stable and remain in line with Council's current long term strategy.


Asset Renewal Ratio
